
2023 IMPACT REPORT

NUMBERRES

Over the past year, Cross Roads OBX peer support specialists have served 163 of our friends and neighbors with 725 encounters. Those struggling with substance use disorder often find themselves on a path of self destruction. This can lead to lifethreatening situations, homelessness, or entry into the justice system. Cross Roads OBX hopes to stop that cycle by providing compassion, care, and connection to a path of recovery. There are 3 areas to note in the below *Encounters graph*:

- Medical Care/Detox/Rehab: 114 or 70% of our clients presenting for recovery services received care. SAMHSA reports the national average is 6%.
- Cessation of Drug/Alcohol Use: Of those 114 clients, close to 30% successfully completed treatment and continue in recovery. NIDA statics show the national average is 20%.
- Connection to a Local Church: Cross Roads is happy to share that 33% of these clients have been connected to a local church. Statistics show that this increases recovery success by 84%.



'God's Unfailing Love Transforms Us' Stories of Redemption

Mark died on January 14th. His heart stopped due to an overdose of Fentanyl. Gratefully, he was resuscitated and referred to Cross Roads. We connected him with many life-saving resources including health insurance, rides to appointments, navigation through the judicial system, rehabilitation and treatment. We held him accountable for his actions and cheered his successes. He was very willing and ready to do the work required. Much time, effort, and prayer went into Mark's recovery and after four months of treatment he went into a sober living house. He is now successfully employed, has his own apartment and volunteers for the recovery community helping others find their path.

Mary was removed from the family home due to alcohol abuse. The authorities brought her to OBX Hospital and Cross Roads was contacted. Our peer support specialist met with her, assessed her situation, and arranged for treatment at a facility where Mary would have a strong support system. A Cross Roads volunteer drove her two hours to a train station, provided food, clothing, and other needs for her trip. She successfully finished six months of treatment and is living a sober life. She has recommitted her life to Jesus and is passionate about sharing her faith.

A Message From Our Board of Directors

This grip of addiction has taken hold of our families, friends and neighbors, regardless of age, gender, race or education, those whose families are saved or unsaved, financially set or just getting by.

Cross Roads response to this epidemic has been total "boots on the ground". Taking a Leap of Faith, we hired an additional parttime peer support advocate to assess, coordinate, mentor, and provide referrals for resources like detox, rehab, treatment, clothing, food, housing and overdose prevention/Narcan training. As shown on page one of our report, the Cross Roads team has served 163 of our friends, neighbors, and family members over this past year. Think on that - One Hundred Sixty Three lives that could have been lost to drug or alcohol addiction, but were saved. Praise God!

As we look around at the overwhelming destruction caused by drugs and alcohol, it can be easy to assume it is hopeless and that there is no chance for real change. Yet, we believe all is not lost, the battle isn't over. God has given us the mission of providing care and hope to our community. Hope for a better tomorrow, hope for hearts and lives to be changed and hope for real freedom.
